The following tables contain data derived from the 2016-2017 Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) Annual Medical School Questionnaire - Part II. In February 2017, the questionnaire was sent to the 145 LCME-accredited medical schools with students enrolled in at least one year of the curriculum. There was a 100% response rate. Each questionnaire was reviewed and attempts were made to verify information and to obtain missing data. Data from other years that are included in the

tables were obtained from previous LCME Annual Medical School Questionnaires.
