

# Medical Schools in the United States, 2018-2019

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The following tables contain data derived from the 2018-2019 Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) Annual Medical School Questionnaire-Part II. In March 2019, the questionnaire was sent to the 151 LCME-accredited medical schools with students enrolled in at least 1 year of the curriculum. There was a 100% response rate. Each questionnaire was reviewed and attempts were made to verify information and to obtain missing data. Data from other years that are included in the

tables were obtained from previous LCME Annual Medical School Questionnaires-Part II.
